The Canadian Medical Association (CMA) welcomes the opportunity to provide comments to the Senate Committee on Legal and Constitutional Affairs concerning the Bill C-2, an Act to amend the Criminal Code and to make consequential amendments to other Acts, which will continue our commitment to the protection of the proposed legislation that relates to proposed drug

Canada's objectives support measures aimed at reducing the incidence of drug-resistance, the safety and efficacy of drugs, and the health of patients. In the context of patient safety, health care professionals have a duty to ensure that patients receive the highest quality of care.

Parliamentary committees that are reviewing the Bill will be interested to know that the CMA has the following comments to make:

- Research from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) indicates that all of the population have been under the influence of cannabis in the past year, an increase from 74% in 2002 and 64% in 2000.
- The most common drug-resistance is due to the misuse of antibiotics (3.3%), prescription drugs (3.3%), and other drugs (3.3%).
